

The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey and its port and trucking industry partners are dedicated to reducing air emissions generated by mobile sources associated with marine terminal operations and activities.

The Clean Truck Program, which is an action in the Clean Air Strategy for the port, is addressing emissions from drayage trucks serving Port Authority marine terminal facilities, with the overall goal of phasing out the oldest, most polluting trucks first. The trucks addressed by this program are Class 8 on-road vehicles with a Gross Vehicle Weight Rating of 33,001 pounds or greater.

Beginning January 1, 2011, all Class 8 Drayage Trucks seeking entry onto any Port Authority Terminal, primarily container and bulk terminals as well as warehouses, must be registered in the Drayage Truck Registry prior to the date of entry.

### **Registration Worksheet**

The online registration process takes approximately 15-20 minutes. The DTR provides a help link with step-by-step instructions to guide you through the registration. There is no cost to register, nor is there a fee for the sticker. To expedite that process, please have readily available the following information:

\* A Standard Carrier Alpha Code (SCAC) is issued by the National Motor Freight Traffic Association. This code is only needed if you service a container terminal.

\*\* This is the combined weight of the three axles and is normally found on the inside door panel of the driver's side.

## Locating the EPA Engine Family Name and Engine Specifications


The EPA engine family name is an 11 or 12 character number/letter designation included on the engine nameplate for all heavy duty truck engines sold in the United States. The nameplate will also provide information about the engine model year. In general, the nameplate is permanently affixed to the engine but the exact location and appearance of the nameplate varies by engine manufacturer. Examples of nameplates from three major engine manufacturers are included below.

*Note that the length of the Engine Family Name varies by engine model year as follows:*

1998 and newer engines – 12 characters (a decimal point counts as a character)

1997 and older engines – 11 characters (a decimal point counts as a character)



 Engine Model Year – 2005



For each truck registered, you will be provided two copies of one of a color-coded sticker. These stickers will be mailed starting in November 2010. Truck owners are encouraged to register their vehicles in the Drayage Truck Registry now, so as to ensure receipt of the stickers prior to January 1, 2011. The sticker color will be based upon the model year of the vehicle's engine:

**Blue Stickers** will be issued for – trucks with 1994 - 2006 model year engines powered by diesel fuel. These stickers will have an expiration date of December 31, 2016.

**Green Stickers** will be issued for – trucks with 2007 and newer model year engines powered by diesel fuel and all Class 8 alternative fuel vehicles (regardless of model year) with fuel types: compressed natural gas (CNG), liquefied natural gas (LNG), electric or hybrid. These stickers will not have an expiration date.

There are no stickers for Class 8 vehicles with 1993 or older model year engines. If you own such a vehicle, please consider submitting an application for the Truck Replacement Program. To learn more, visit [www.replacemytruck.org](http://www.replacemytruck.org) or call toll free 1-877-309-1680.

To facilitate and expedite the truck's transit onto, through and out of Port Authority marine terminals, place one sticker on the upper left-hand corner of the driver's door and one on the upper right-hand corner of the passenger side door of the registered truck. Please follow the instruction on the sticker. Apply the Compliance Sticker on the truck prior to dispatching the truck to any Port Authority marine terminal.

Please note that each registered truck is pre-assigned a specific sticker number. Please ensure that each sticker number and the associated vehicle VIN number are correctly matched as this will be subject to audit by the Port Authority or its designated agent.

All Port of New York and New Jersey marine terminals are using the same sticker system; you will not need a separate sticker for each marine terminal location.
