

Appendix B – Regionally significant highway facilities

Highway	Location Summary – NEW JERSEY
I-280	Within the port district I-280 begins at its Interchange (47) with I-80 in Morris County, New Jersey. It extends eastward through West Orange, Newark, and Harrison, New Jersey, with an eastern terminus at I-95 near Kearny.
I-287	I-287 starts at I-95 in the southern portion of the port district. It moves out of the District and takes a course west and then extends north of the port district. It connects with the New York State Thruway in Rockland County, NY, where it moves east, crosses the Hudson at the Tappan Zee Bridge, and re-connects with I-95 in Westchester County.
I-78	A major east/west Interstate highway between the Holland Tunnel and Exit 45, its western limit within the port district. I-78 also connects other points in New Jersey and Pennsylvania (including Allentown).
I-80	I-80 provides east-west Interstate routing for the port. In the port district, I-80 crosses the northern section near Paterson and Hackensack and terminates at I-95 in Bergen County. I-80 is a major corridor for goods coast to coast with key hubs such as Chicago.
US-46	US 46 parallels I-80 crossing west-east through the port district and provides access to Morris County, I-80, I-280, the Garden State Parkway near Clifton, and I-95 connection west of Fort Lee before ending at the George Washington Bridge.
US 22	US 22 provides access to the east at Newark from both US 1/9 and I-78. It parallels I-78 to the south. US 22 has more access points than a limited access route resulting in lower speeds than the Interstates in normal operation.
US 1/9	This major north-south route proceeds north by Newark International Airport and merges with the Pulaski Highway at I-95. Truck 1/9 continues north to Jersey City, Union City, and North Bergen, and splits in the vicinity of the George Washington Bridge. Major 1/9 interchanges serving the port are located at Elizabeth and Newark.
US 1	US 1 enters the port district in the southwestern corner near New Brunswick and joins with Route 9 at the town of Avenel (see Route 1/9 description above). US 1 splits from US 1/9 in the Bronx and goes north to Connecticut. The southern portion of US 1 goes through New Jersey to Pennsylvania.
NJ 17	NJ 17 provides access to the north from its connection with NJ 3 near Rutherford. It provides connections to I-80 at Hackensack and NJ 4 in Bergen County and proceeds north to both I-87 and I-287 near the NJ/NY border.
NJ 18	NJ 18 provides a southern route from the port district at Interchange 9 of the NJ Turnpike in Middlesex County.
NJ 24	This state route provides west-east connection between I-287 near Morristown, NJ and I-78 near Springfield in Union County.
NJ 28	NJ Route 28 provides access in the southern part of the port district. It extends from Elizabeth east to Somerset County NJ.
NJ 36	NJ 36 originates at the Garden State Parkway at Interchange 117 in the southern extreme of the port district (Monmouth County).
NJ 440	NJ 440 begins at the juncture of I-95 and I-287 in the southern portion of the port district, northwest of Perth Amboy. It crosses into Staten Island over the Outerbridge Crossing and goes north along the West Shore Expressway crossing the Kill Van Kull over the Bayonne Bridge.

Table B1 Highway location summary for NJ

Highway	Location Summary – NEW YORK
I-278	Begins at US1/9 near Elizabeth, New Jersey, crosses Staten Island and becomes the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway. Major water crossings include the Goethals, Verrazano Narrows, and the Triborough bridges. I-278 interchanges with I-95 at the former terminus in the Bronx.
I-495	Provides access to the east from the port in the vicinity of Union City NJ. It crosses the Hudson through the Lincoln Tunnel, and the East River through the Queens Midtown Tunnel. I-495 then becomes the Long Island Expressway.
I-684	I-684 provides north access at Westchester County from I-287.
I-87	Also known as the New York Thruway, I-87 traverses north of the port district and crosses the Tappan Zee bridge, turns south through Westchester County to the Bronx, and ends at the Triborough Bridge.

Table B2 Highway location summary for NY

Highway	Location Summary – NEW YORK/NEW JERSEY
I-95	This major north/south Interstate enters the port district from the south at Middlesex County, NJ. It passes through the entire port district from southwest to northeast and includes the major points of Elizabeth, Newark, Kearny, Seacacus, North Bergen, Fort Lee, the Bronx, and Westchester County. I-95, beyond the port district, provides access along the entire Atlantic Seaboard from Florida to Maine. The New Jersey Turnpike/I-95 corridor is one of the most significant highways in the region, and probably the most significant truck route. It extends across the George Washington Bridge (GWB) and links the region with large northeastern and mid-Atlantic markets. Route 1/9 is also a major truck route that parallels I-95 and provides truck access to the Port Newark/Elizabeth complex and the other intermodal yards in Northern New Jersey.
