

Vehicles Salvaged from World Trade Center Begin Journey to new Home

Two New York Fire Department vehicles began a journey from New York City to Virginia Wednesday. The vehicles were salvaged from the World Trade Center rubble after the 9/11 attacks. They have been housed in a hangar at John F. Kennedy International Airport since being removed from ground zero. Beams from the fallen towers are also stored there. Both vehicles are going to a museum in Virginia after being displayed at the Pentagon. The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, which owns the airport and previously owned the World Trade Center, said the vehicles are important parts of history. "Distributing these materials to museums, including a stop at the Pentagon and ultimately the newly constructed museum in Virginia for Americans in Wartime, is an incredibly important thing in educating this generation, future generations and making sure we never forget," said Port Authority spokesperson Pat Foye. A piece of steel salvaged from the North Tower parking garage is also going to the museum.
